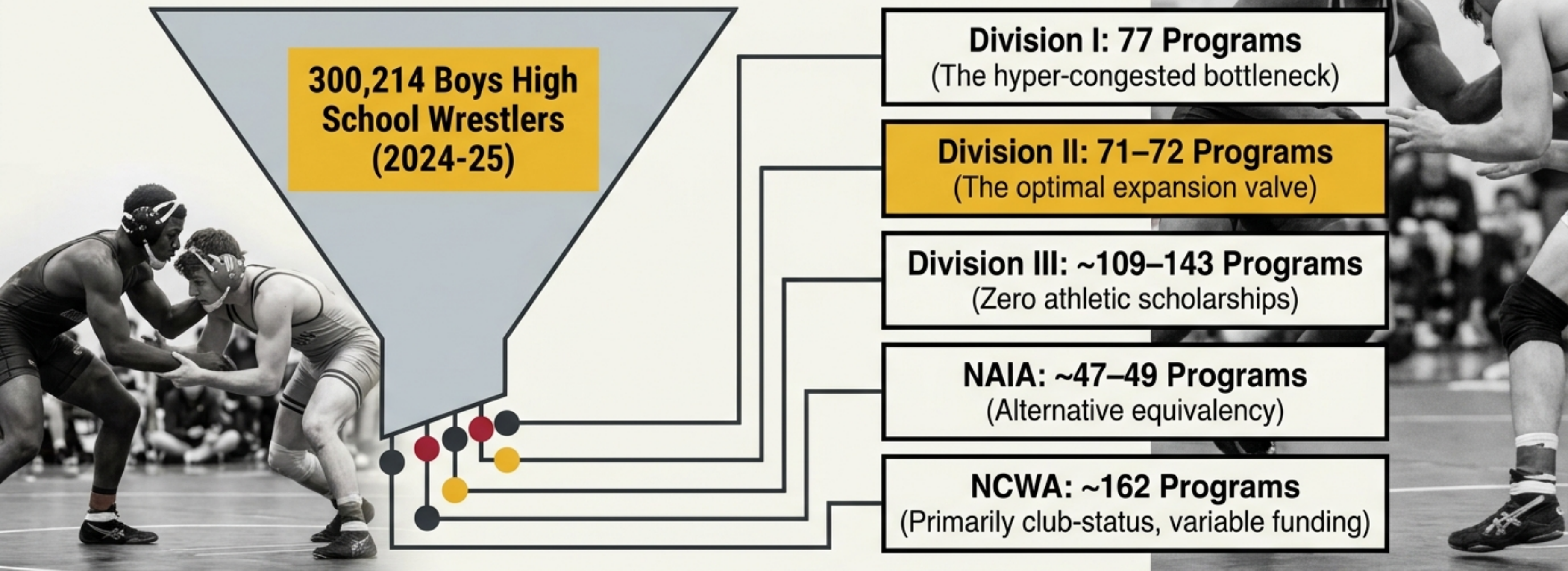

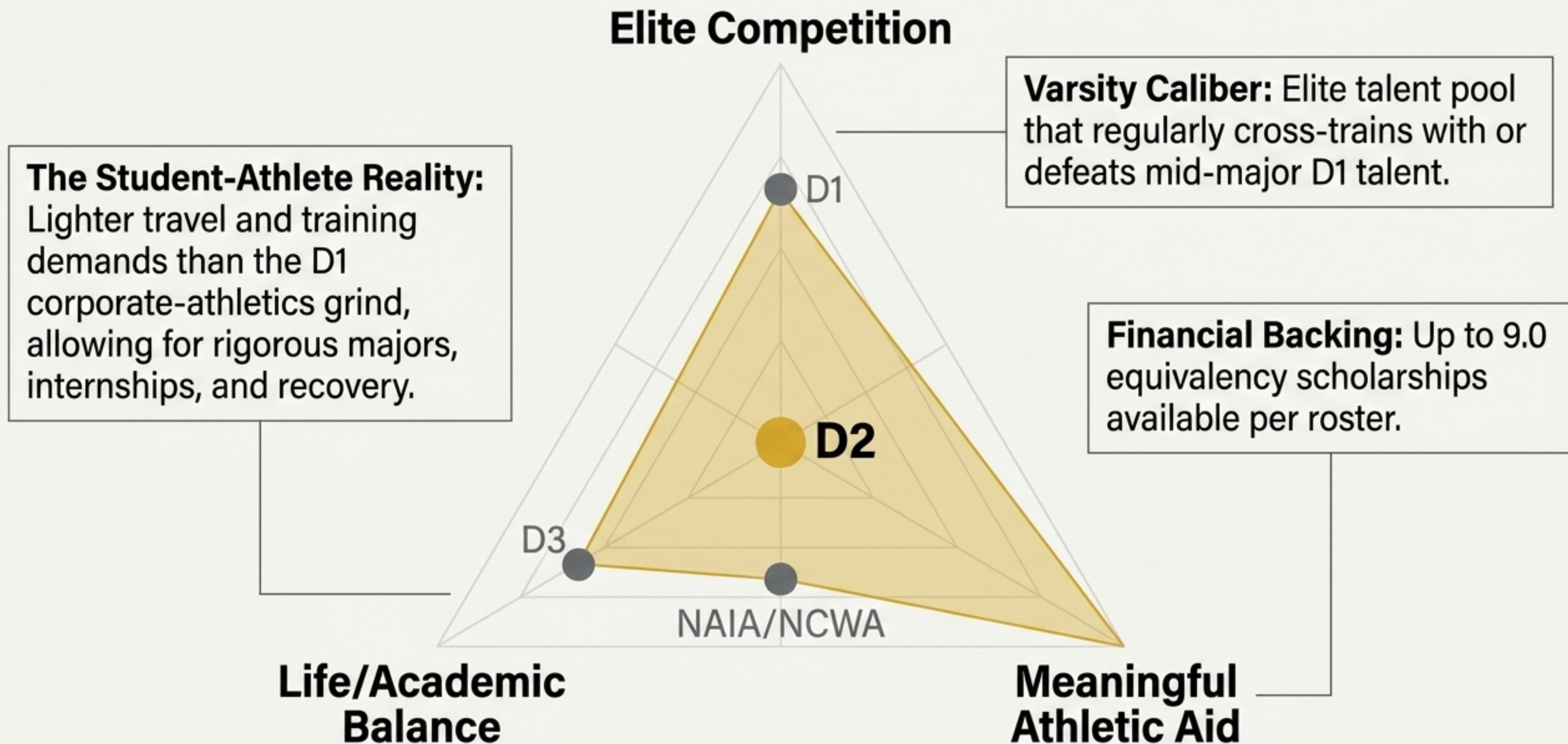
The Division II Ecosystem

Defining the Division II Sweet Spot



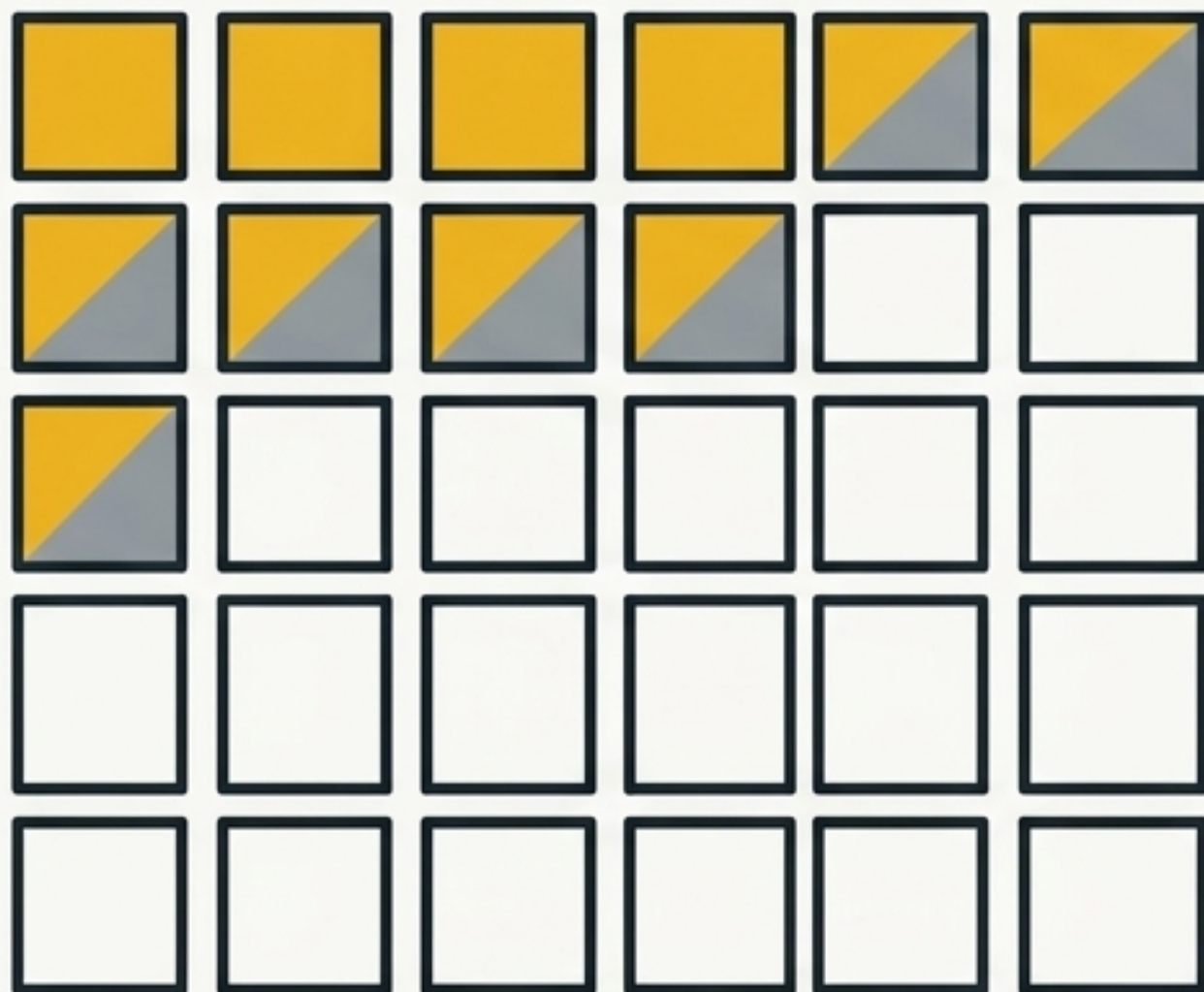

Synthesis: D2 consistently scores the highest aggregate rating across all lifestyle, financial, and competitive variables.

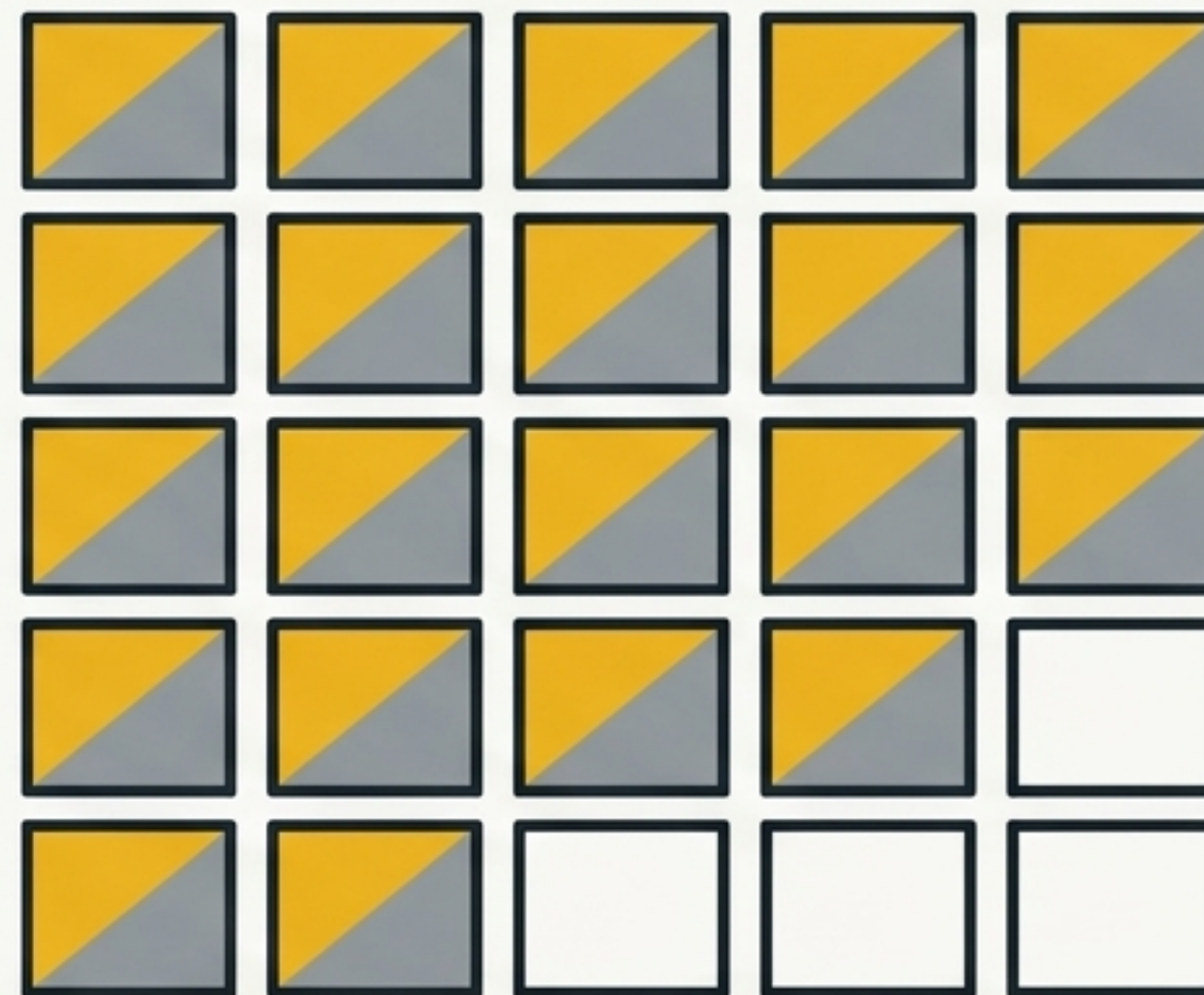
Demystifying the House v. NCAA Economics

Opt-In Division I (30-Man Limit)



The 30-man limit is a ceiling, not a floor.
Top-heavy funding leaves fractions for the rest.

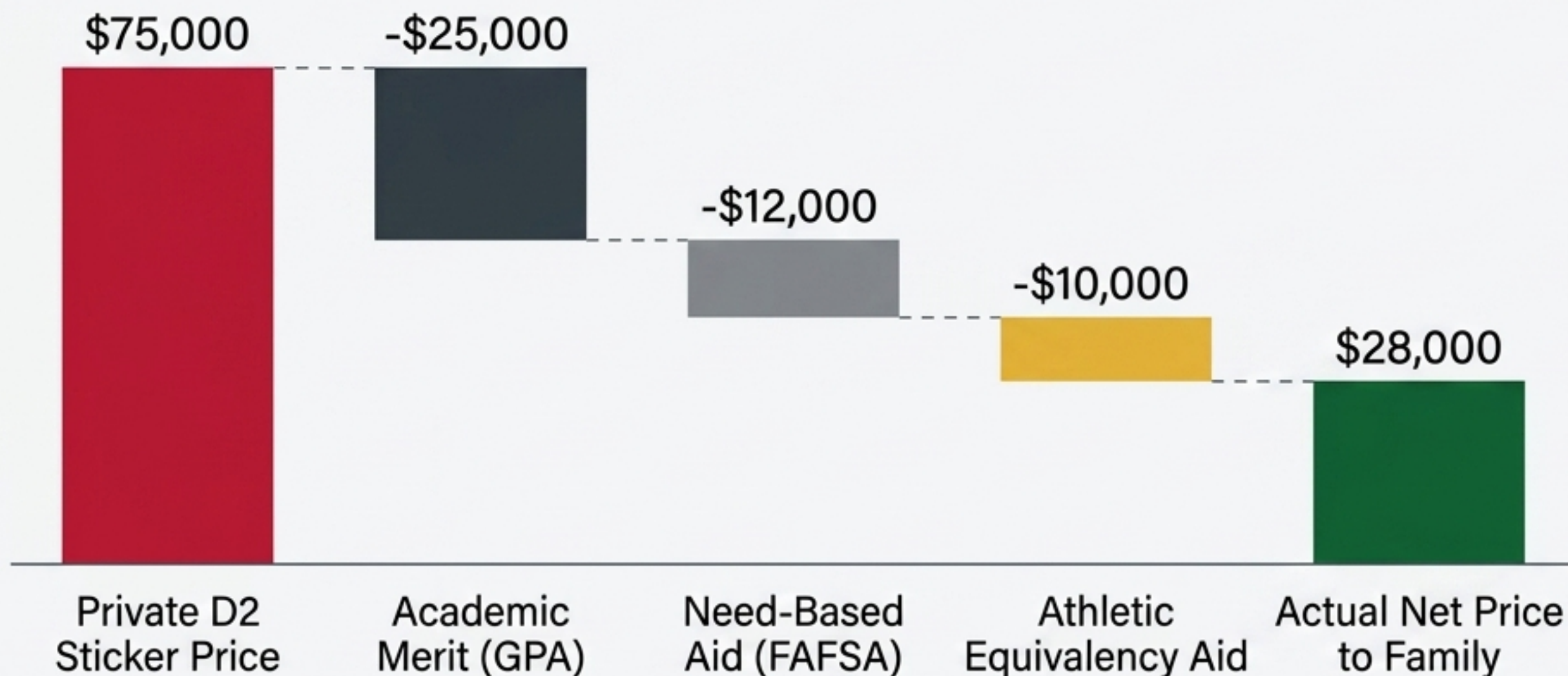
Division II (9.0 Equivalency)



Smaller rosters allow 9.0 equivalency limits to
stretch further per athlete on a percentage basis.

ACTION COMMAND: Do not ask "Do you have scholarships?" Ask the DI coach:
Ask the DI coach: "How many athletes on your 30-man roster are receiving zero athletic aid?"

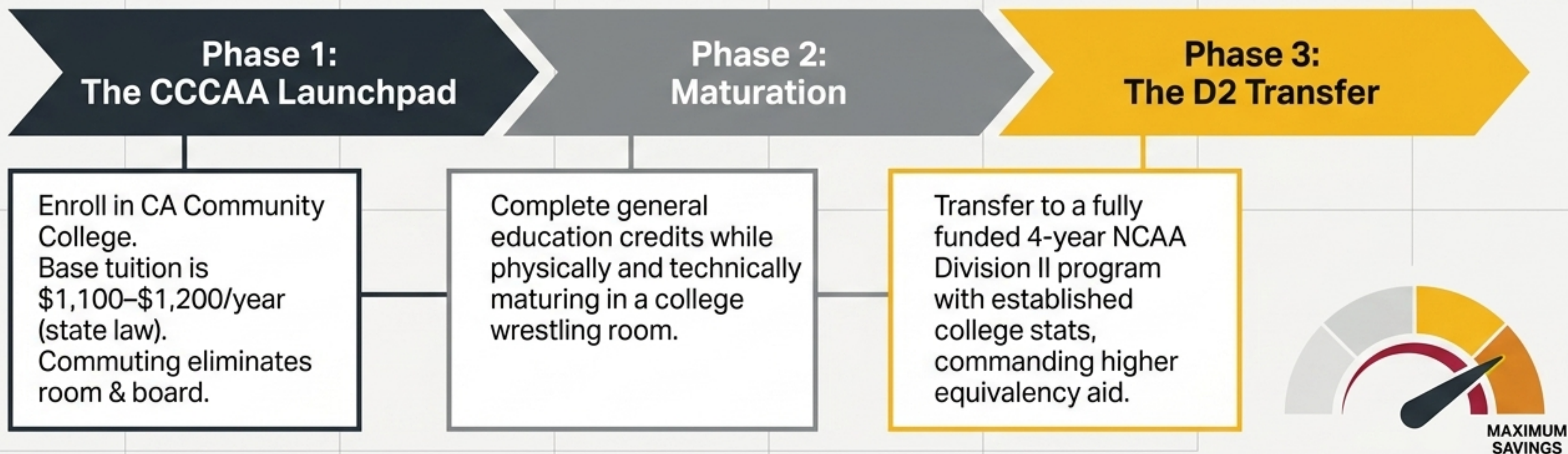
The Sticker Price vs. Net Price Paradox



Comparison Data:
Out-of-state public university net price typically ranges from \$20,000 to \$58,000.

Takeaway: Maintaining a high high-school GPA is the primary lever for securing private institutional merit aid, which legally “stacks” with D2 athletic money to beat public school pricing.

The Catalyst: The 2025-2026 season marks the inaugural NCAA Women's Wrestling Championship, forcing institutions to aggressively fund these rosters.

Title IX Proportionality: As opt-in DI schools increase men's limits to 30, they must legally balance opportunities. Women's wrestling is the primary growth engine for this compliance.

The Result: Women's wrestling is currently the most "scholarship-accessible" growth sector in the collegiate landscape.



Identifying the Ideal Division II Athlete Profile

 A state-level placer or consistent winner, but not a multi-time national blue-chip finalist.	 Immediate, realistic pathways to meaningful mat time.
 A student seeking partial scholarship help rather than banking on a mythical D1 full ride.	 The ability to stack athletic, academic, and need-based aid.
 An athlete who wants to crack a starting lineup early in their career.	 The infrastructure of varsity NCAA athletics without the grueling, year-round corporate-style DI schedule.
 A student who prioritizes a high-value degree and a traditional college social life.	 A legitimate pipeline to NCAA All-American status.

The Strategic Return on Investment



Division II is not a consolation prize. Amidst 300,000 competitors and shifting financial rules, it is the most mathematically and holistically sound decision an athlete can make to ensure they wrestle, grow, and graduate on their own terms.
