113 NCAA Women's Teams Stand in Sharp Contrast to 250+ Men's Programs

While men's wrestling has a deeply established multi-divisional presence, women's wrestling is in a phase of rapid expansion. However, a major misconception is the size of the Division I women's program landscape.

ESTABLISHED MEN'S PROGRAMS

- NCAA Division I: 77 Programs
Historically capped at 9.9 scholarships, now transitioning.
- NCAA Division II: 71 Programs
Operates under stable partial equivalency models.
- NCAA Division III: ~109-130 Programs
The largest division by team count, with zero athletic aid.

EMERGING & EXPANDING WOMEN'S PROGRAMS

- Total NCAA Teams: 113 Programs Combined
Across all three divisions (DI, DII, and DIII) combined.
- Division I Women's Specifics: Only a Small Portion
Unlike the men's 77+ teams, only a small minority of active NCAA women's programs are at DI schools.
- Club and Non-NCAA Elements: ~350+ Teams
The '500 women's teams' statistic is heavily inflated by 250+ NCWA/clubs and NAIA/NJCAA junior colleges.

DI Roster Caps Shift to 30 as DII & CCCAA Retain Previous Scholarship Models

NCAA DIVISION I 30-Athlete Roster Limit

- The Paradigm Shift
Old scholarship caps (9.9 men / 10.0 women) are replaced by a maximum roster limit of 30.
- Discretionary Funding
Schools **can** award athletic aid up to all 30 spots. However, most programs continue to offer partial packages due to athletic department budgets.
- *Reality Check*
30 roster spots does not mean 30 full rides. True full rides remain rare, and aid is split across the team.

NCAA DIVISION II Partial Equivalency Model

- Men's Limits Unchanged
Division II men's programs remain strictly under the old 9.0 equivalency scholarship cap.
- Women's Limits
Division II women's programs operate under an equivalency cap of generally around 10.0.
- Distribution
Coaches divide this pool among many rostered starters, making partial athletic packages the standard.

DIII, CCCAA, & OTHER BODIES Academic & Need-Based Focus

- NCAA Division III
Strictly zero athletic scholarships. Affordability is driven entirely by need-based aid and academic merit awards.
- CCCAA (California)
State law prohibits athletic scholarships. Wrestlers rely on standard financial aid and tuition fee waivers.
- NAIA & NJCAA
NAIA programs offer up to 8.0-10.0 equivalencies. NJCAA offers up to 20 tuition-and-fees scholarships.

Sticker Price Exceeds \$60K while Net Price After Aid Slashes Out-of-Pocket Costs

THE RECRUIT'S FINANCIAL PARADOX

- **Sticker vs. Net Price**
Published 'tuition and fees' is rarely what families actually pay. Net price (sticker minus all aid) is the only metric that matters.
- **Stacking Strategy**
Because wrestling awards are almost always partial, families must combine athletic aid with academic merit and FAFSA need-based aid to drive down out-of-pocket costs.
- **Out-of-Pocket Reality**
Living expenses (housing and food) add over \$18,000 annually. Do not neglect these in your modeling!

Institution Type	Lowest Annual	Median Annual	Average Net Price
Community College (CCCCAA / NJCAA)	\$3,500 – \$6,000	\$12,000 – \$16,000	\$10,500 / year
Public 4-Year (NCAA DII / NAIA / DI)	\$12,000 – \$18,000	\$24,000 – \$32,000	\$26,500 / year
Private 4-Year (NCAA DIII / NAIA / DI)	\$28,000 – \$35,000	\$45,000 – \$55,000	\$48,000 / year

Four Crucial Questions for 2026-2027 Recruits to Uncover True College Costs

When negotiating with college coaches for the 2026-2027 cycle, do not make assumptions about roster limits or automatic full rides. Ask these four diagnostic questions directly:

1. Roster-to-Aid Ratio

"How many of your 30 roster spots are actually receiving athletic aid?"
Uncover whether the program is fully funded or dividing limited dollars across the roster.

2. Real Starter Package

"What is the average scholarship package given to returning starters?"
This bypasses high-end recruiter promises and shows you what real student-athletes on the team receive.

3. Stacking Permissions

"What academic or need-based aid can be layered on top of athletic aid?"
Confirm whether the athletic department allows institutional academic merit scholarships to stack directly.

4. Net Price Calculation

"What is the estimated net out-of-pocket cost remaining for our family?"
Ensure you compute this against the school's full Cost of Attendance, including housing, meals, and books.
